Ming Wang To Talk U.S.-China Trade Issues Wednesday

Dr. Ming Wang, a world-class cataract and LASIK eye surgeon, philanthropist, and community activist, will be our speaker Wednesday and the subject will be U.S.-China trade relations.

He is the founding director of Wang Vision Institute and a Clinical Professor at Meharry Medical College in Nashville.



Wang has performed over 55,000 procedures,

including more than 4,000 on doctors. His patients include music stars such as Dolly Parton, the late Charlie Daniels, Kenny Chesney, Naomi Judd, Nicole Kidman and Amy Grant.

Wang is the founding president of the Tennessee Chinese Chamber of Commerce.

Wang grew up during China's Cultural Revolution in the 1960s. During this time, millions of innocent youth were deported to remote areas to face life sentences of poverty and hard labor. He had to play the Chinese violin ("erhu") and learn to dance in order to try to escape a life in labor camps. He eventually made his way to America with only \$50. He eventually graduated with the highest honors from Harvard Medical School and MIT.

Wang is a champion amateur ballroom dancer and was a finalist in the world pro-am international 10-dance championships. Playing his erhu, he accompanied country music legend Dolly Parton on her album, "Those Were the Days."

Knoxville Zoo's Lisa New Gives Great Update On Surviving the Pandemic

Lisa New's "Pandemic to Possibility" program Wednesday about the Knoxville Zoo was chock full of fascinating information about survival, the future and details about our zoo that you might not have known.

When COVID forced the March 16 closing, New, the Zoo Director, said "it was the worst time for us to close but we had no choice." They were emerging from a winter season when they are financially

strapped. They did not reopen until May 18 and they lost \$22,500 a day.

During those 63 days, they still had to care for the animals' needs and keep them protected. Keeper's schedules were changed. She said pandemic donations of \$250,000, the government's PPP



program, the CARES grant, plus city and county relief made all the difference and the zoo is back to about 85% of pre-COVID attendance.

Here are a few other things she shared:

• The zoo's three tigers are doing OK after testing positive for COVID. "No doubt a keeper or someone from the public infected them," New said. "They

were mildly ill."

- The zoo has a new male lion and a new female is about to arrive so the zoo will have a breeding pair.
- The new North American River Otter area will open April 2021.
- The new \$18 million Amphibian and Reptile Conservation Center will open this coming spring.

A new fundraiser is just around the corner — Knoxville's newest light spectacular called "Zoo Lights." This will be an outdoor lantern light-up at Zoo Knoxville with a variety of colorful animal lanterns, tree lights, and more. It begins Nov. 27 and runs through Jan. 3 from 5-9 p.m. nightly.

What follows here are updates on these truly important service projects.

Children's Hospital Christmas Project

Our project for the kids at ETCH to have a fun Christmas with toys that we donate is off to a start but it is a slow start and we need to pick up the pace Farragut Rotarians. This is a great project, spurred by new member Scott Bertini and being coordinated by our Service Projects Committee. We need to get excited about this project folks. Do not wait until the last minute to send in your gifts. Share this project on your social media.

Here is a quick update from Scott: "There are 152 beds at ETCH and not every one will be filled, but our stretch goal is 152 toys. But ETCH will be thankful for whatever we can provide. Right now we have roughly 25 gifts but the concerning part is that they are only from roughly four or five donations."



We also are planning to deliver the toys in handmade Christmas bags. The Hardin Valley Academy Interact Club on Monday will start sewing 152 bags for toys. PP Leah Berry, our advisor to the HVA Interact Club, bought more than \$100 of fabric for the students to use. "They also are working on fabric donations this week and a websavvy student in the club may create a virtual tree for gifts that can be sent to Scott's email address," Leah says. "They are really excited about the project!"

Service Projects Co-Chair Sonya Ford says anyone who wants to sew a Christmas bag is welcome to help us. She says dimensions of the bags are 24" x 36" and the bag should be in Christmas print or colors. "For any of our non-sewers who want to learn how to sew I'm happy to give lessons," Sonya says.
